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Collecting Covers from the Source

I have been collecting SOS issues for much of my life and still have in my collection my own Great Britain 1940 cover serviced at my own local post office when I just happened to be on RAF leave at the time, but apart from that occasion I do not recall any other issues, other than

a couple of Free Polish and Czech issponsored by the relevant governments in exile in Britain, much of the later issues appearing in the late forties. But even at that time and up to the sixties there were rarely more

than a half dozen SOS issues worldwide annually unlike today when they seem to appear every week or so!

My own practice was to simply keep abreast of impending stamp centenaries and other anniversaries by referring to the catalogue and then writing to the relevant administrations for the brochure which usually preceded the issue, from which I would make out my order and enclosing with it my own design of cover and cards together with my instructions for servicing. Many head offices were prepared to pass some of these on to sub offices for servicing there, though frequently the canceling left something to be desired – as it still

does. But at least all were genuine postal items, some registered, unlike the purely cosmetic "FDC's" sent under separate cover by the modern phenomenon "The Philatelic Office", whom I attempt to by pass at all times!

In the time of the British Empire the

domestic postal order was freely interchangeable across its length and breadth, providing cheap and easy means of payment, as it still is in the many of the territories of the modern Commonwealth

Nations, though the facility is gradually being withdrawn leaving the only alternative of expensive banking services.

Foreign orders could be funded by the International Reply facility as a cheap means of remittance, though this method has been largely lost because of the expense of them today. Alternatively, I would purchase foreign mint sets from British dealers and use them to frank my own covers and cards to be dispatched and hopefully be returned to me. Though this method was generally a gamble, it frequently paid off in unusual additions returned to me from time to

Thailand Revealed - Part II

(Continued from January, 1999) The second set of Thai SOS stamps appeared in 1975 (Sc 741-4) in conjunction with the Third THAIPEX. This set is symbolic in style and one of the stamps features collecting.

A single SOS (Sc 826) was issued for THAIPEX '77. The 75 Satang value paid the first class rate, and at this time translated into four US cents. It reproduces Scott 609 depicting the current king, Rama IX, and also contains a blue monochrome collage of 33 Thai stamps. Rama IX became king in 1946 after the mysterious death of Rama VIII. It is unclear whether Rama VIII accidentally shot himself while cleaning a gun, committed suicide or was assassinated. This stamp, issued on 8/4/77, has always had personal significance as I lived in Thailand at the time and attended the Exhibition. At the time I was a "lapsed" collector. However, I bought a few Thai new issues because they were so attractive and became an active collector again.

In 1979 four symbolic style stamps (Sc 886-9) were issued for THAIPEX '79. Pseudostamps on all four values provided a faux se-tenant effect with the themes being letter writing and stamp collecting.

THAIPEX '81 saw the release of a set of four stamps (Sc 966-9) similar in concept to the 1971 set reproducing various early definitive stamps.

The first anniversary of postal codes resulted in the release on 2/25/83 of a 1.25 Baht first class rate stamp which was the first time Thailand produced a stamp reproducing itself in the design. This interesting item is Scott 1024.

The run-up to the second international exhibition, BANGKOK '93, began in 1991. Seven stamps and two souvenir sheets were issued (Sc 1410-16a) The stamps reproduced are Thailand's Coronation Commemorative of 11/11/08 which celebrated the forty first year of the reign of King Chulalongkorn (Sc 118-24).

The souvenir sheet (Sc 1416a) was issued in perfo-

rate and imperforate versions. For a reason I can not understand, Scott refuses to assign catalog numbers to Thai imperforate souvenir sheets despite the fact that they are deliberately generated by the Communications Authority of Thailand (CAT), are valid for postage and CAT even includes them in their new issue standing order program. The 8 Baht sheets sold for 15b, with the difference going to the BANGKOK '93 organizers.



A second SOS set was issued on 1/7/92 as a prelude to BANG-KOK '93 (Sc 1473-77a). This set

returns to a favorite theme and reproduces stamps depicting Rama V through IX. Four of the five stamps reproduce the high values of various definitive series.

The Thai authorities faced a dilemma when deciding which stamp would be reproduced to honor Rama VIII, because the only definitive series issued during his short reign did not show the king on the high value. Instead a very boyish looking king appeared on the low values in the set. There may have been concern that selecting one of these stamps would be disrespectful because it was not the high value, as were the others to be used. Finally selected was the single stamp issue of 5/1/43 showing a formal portrait of King Ananda Mahidol which was reproduced on the 7 Baht value. A souvenir sheet containing all five stamps was also issued in perforated and imperforate versions.

The last Thai stamp using a SOS theme appeared on 2/25/97 as part of a se-tenant pair (Sc 1710-11) which marked the introduction of computerized mail sorting at the Laksi Mail Center in Bangkok. The right hand stamp includes a stamped envelope with the design of the 1998-95 definitive series. Based on its color, the re-

time, e.g., a couple of covers from the Caroline Island fairly recently where an apparent shortage of an 'O' plug resulted in a beautifully clear cancel of the 'Caroline Islands' when a 'D' plug was substituted!

Other sources have been by searching through dealers stock stamp fairs through overseas contacts, though one can be time consuming and the other frequently ephemeral. Auctions rarely specialize in our material and even the stamp club auctions show little variety. Perhaps the oldest

method of swapping might be ideal, although here again I doubt if anyone today has the hoard of duplicate material I personally have assembled over the years, so as to establish a realistic means of exchange.



produced stamp is Scott 1233 issued on 7/2/88.

Thailand, unlike many Asian countries, has issued numerous postal items with a stamps on stamps theme. By my count there are 31 individual stamps and 5 souvenir sheets. These emissions have honored Thai history and helped the Thai people develop their national pride. I hope we will be seeing more SOS stamps from Thailand in the coming years.

NEW DEFINITIVES FOR QUEEN ELIZABETH II

Upon the succession of Queen Elizabeth II, Bermuda needed a new definitive series featuring the new Queen and a new set of 16 values were introduced on November 9, 1953. Two of the three values featuring the Perot Postmaster stamp are shown at right on a registered first day cover.



CENTENARY OF UPU MEMBERSHIP

It took until June 20, 1977 for the stamp on stamp motif to be used again. Bermuda celebrated a centenary of UPU membership with an issue of five stamps. A block of four of the sole SOS from that series, the 15¢ value (Scott 351) reproduces Bermuda Scott X1.





EXTENDING THE 1953 DEFINITIVES

Bermuda issued on January 6, 1958 a 9d. value of the 1953 definitive series in the same design as the 4½d. Although issued in 1958 this stamp, shown on the cover at left, has come to be regarded as a member of the 1953 series.

SIR ROWLAND HILL

The death centenary of Sir Rowland was honored on February 25, 1980 with four stamps having an SOS motif. This beautiful set aptly commemorates the genius responsible for one of history's most practical innovations, the penny postage inaugu-



rated in 1840. Each stamp in the series features the Perot Postmaster stamp, and the Penny Black of Great Britain is featured on the 8ϕ value. A portrait of Sir Rowland Hill, a cover with a red strike of Bermuda's "Paid I", and a large representation of the Bermuda "Paid I" mark in black are shown on the 20ϕ , 25ϕ , and 50ϕ values respectively. Bermuda's Stamps on Stamps - Part II

AMERIPEX '86

Four stamps and a souvenir sheet were issued on 5/22/86 to commemorate the international philatelic exhibition,

AMERIPEX '86 The souvenir sheet did not feature a stamp on stamp design, but the four values of the set featured previous issued Bermuda stamps which were selected for their association the United States.

The 5¢ value features the souvenir sheet from the 1984 issue com-

memorating the 375th anniversary of Bermuda. The stamps on stamps of the souvenir sheet on the 5ϕ value depict the \$1 stamp showing the fleet at Plymouth and the 30ϕ value showing

the settlement in Jamestown Virginia, while the souvenir sheet shows the intended route and the wreck of Sea Venture.

The 40¢ value portrays the 24¢ stamp from Bermuda's 1973

centenary of tennis issue and shows Staten Island Court, America's first lawn tennis club.

The 50¢ value features the 12¢ stamp f r o m Bermuda's 1 9 8 3 centenary of manned flight

issue featuring the "accidental" first flight over Bermuda by the Curtis Jenny in 1919. The \$1 value features the 17¢ stamp showing Eagle USA from the 1976 "Tall Ships Race" issue.

COMMONWEALTH POSTAL CONFERENCE

A set of four stamps issued on November 3, 1989 for the Conference reproduced designs from Bermuda's issue of 1865. This issue was overprinted in 1990 for Stamp World London '90.

25TH ANNIVERSARY OF DECIMILIZATION

The final stamp on stamp issue of Bermuda, at least through mid-1997, was the four value issue of February 6, 1995 (Scott 693-6). Each stamp featured a Bermuda coin and two copies of a Bermuda stamp from the "Bermuda Flowers" decimal issue of 1970. The Bermuda stamps reproduced were Scott 255, 259, 262 and 324 (flower type of 1970 issued in 1975).
